#### 1.INTRODUCTION

IIITN is functioning under the aegis of Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD). Government of India, Department of Higher Education (DHE).Government of Maharashtra and Tata Consultancy services (TCS), Mumbai as Industry Partner. ADCC Infocad Ltd. who was one of the Industry partners of IITN, has been disassociated w.e.fAugust 2018.

Visvesvaraya National Institute of Technology Nagpur (VNIT) is the mentor Institute for Indian Institute of Information Technology Nagpur (IIITN), VNIT is one of the thirty NITs which are also functioning as 'Institutes of National Importance' under the provision of National Institute of Technology Act, 2007.

#### 1.3 Education System

The Institute offers two under Graduate courses

- 1) Computer Science & Engineering (CSE)
- Electronics & Communication Engineering (ECE).

The duration of each course is 4 years. All courses run on semester pattern. Students who have passed 12th standard examination with subjects English, Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics from State Boards of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education or equivalent are eligible for admission to IIITs over India. The admission is done on the basis of the rank obtained by the student in Joint Entrance Exam (JEE) Main Admissions are done through Central Seat Allocation Board (CSAB) by Joint Seat Allocation Authority (JOSAA), Government of India, under the Ministry of HRD, Govt. of India.

Further, the Institute has started offering Ph.D. Programmes in various categories during the year 2018-19. The Institute is supported under "Visvesvaraya Ph.D. Scheme" vide which a onetime incentive of Rs. 2.50 lakhs can be obtained by the student on successful completion of the Ph D Programme.

#### 3.5 Examination & Evaluation

All UG programs run on semester basis. Students are required to register courses for every semester examination. Courses are categorized as core, elective open and humanities courses. Course evaluation mainly includes two Sessional tests, End-semester examination and any other assessment. Course evaluation for laboratory courses is done on continuous basis through quizzes, assignments, seminars etc. Evaluation pattern is relative credit point based grading system on a ten-point scale and grades are awarded on assessment. There is no provision for improvement of grade by re-registering in the course. Students are required to re-register into course in which he/she obtain FF (fail grade) in the subsequent semester. Student performance is indicated by CGPA (Cumulative Grade Point Average) and is not awarded any division/percentage. Student is eligible for the award of degree after completion of various requirements set by the institute in terms of credits, CGPA, and type of courses completed.

Academic rule-book is made available to all the students and is available on the website of the institute. Academic Peer Review of each academic program is being done with the help of faculty members of IIITs, NITs, IITs and members from industry. The suggestions received under this review programme are implemented through respective Board of studies.

## According to UNESCO General Conference (1978) Article 1; which advocates that practice of physical education and sport is a fundamental right for all:

- 1.1 Every human being has a fundamental right of access to physical education and sport, which are essential for the full development of his personality. The freedom to develop physical, intellectual and moral powers through physical education and sports must be guaranteed both within the education system and in other aspects of social life.
- 1.2 Everyone must have full opportunities, in accordance with his national tradition of sport, for practicing physical education and developing his physical fitness and attaining a level of achievement in sport which corresponds to his gifts.



## The Article 2; further endorse that physical education and sports forms an essential element of lifelong education in the overall education system:

- **2.1** Physical education sport, as a practice of sports must be ensured throughout life by means of a global, lifelong and democratized education.
- 2.2 At the individual level, physical education and sport contribute to the essential dimension of education and culture, must develop the abilities, will-power and self-discipline of every human beings as a fully integrated member of society. The continuity of physical activity and the maintenance and improvement of health, provide a wholesome leisure-time occupation and enable man to overcome the drawbacks of modern living. At the community level, they enrich social relations and develop fair play, which is essential not only to sport itself but also to life in society.
- 2.3 Every overall education system must assign the requisite place and importance to physical education and sport in order to establish a balance and strengthen links between physical activities and other components of education.

#### National institutions play a major role in physical education and sport

It is essential that public authorities at all the levels and specialized non-governmental bodies encourage those physical education and sport activities whose educational value is most evident. Their action shall consist enforcing legislation and regulations, providing material assistance and adopting all other measures of encouragement, stimulation and control. The public authorities will also ensure that such fiscal measures are adopted as may encourage these activities.

It is incumbent on all institution s responsible for physical education and sport to promote a consistent, overall and decentralized plan of action in the framework of lifelong education so as to allow for continuity and co-ordination between compulsory physical activities and those practiced freely and spontaneously.

Thus in tune with above ideology, the faculties of physical education at this institute exploit all the possible dimensions of physical education and sports through the variety of activities in our institute:

- Physical education is an audit course at the institute and they are taught sports sills, strategic preparation, and tactical preparation faculties of physical education work to increase the physical fitness of first year students more than 100 numbers through various physical fitness programs. 


#### Important event as per MHRD guidelines:



#### **T&P Orientation Programme:**

T&P Orientation programme was conducted on 18th March 2019 where all the students of 3rd year attended. Mr. Harshad Panse explained the T&P Policy and other activities of the T&P Office to the students. Students' queries were addressed satisfactorily.

#### Industry-Academia Interface

#### 1. Tech Mahindra Ltd

Tech Mahindra Ltd, one of the 1leading software giants with IT facilities in most Tier-1 and Tier-2 cities in India and abroad, visited IIITN on 24th Jan 2019 as a part of Industry Academia Interface. The first batch of 48 students of CSE and ECE participated in an interactive session for internships and placements. The Tech Mahindra team headed by Mr. Rahul Bedmutha (Delivery Head – Carribean and Latin Americas (CALA), was assisted by HR Personnel.

A detailed presentation about Tech Mahindra's various verticals and foreign affiliations was presented by Mr. Rahul Bedmutha. The HR spoke about various policies including training & mentoring, communications, leadership roles and sharing responsibilities. This was followed by active interaction where students cleared their various apprehensions on the projects they have to handle, time-frame and location. The students would complete an internship before the commencement of a full-fledged placement drive.

The Tech M team was welcomed by the Director of the Institute Dr. O G Kakde. During the course of the meeting, the Director discussed various possibilities of assistance from Tech M including collaboration in curriculum development. Possibilities of industry-based syllabi were also discussed. It was proposed by the Director that Tech M may send their officials for a lecture series.

#### 2. Tata Research Design Development Centre (TRDDC Pune)

Mr. Sauvik Bharat and his team members from TRDDC visited IIITN campus on Monday 18th Feb 2019 for interacting with students. Students having CGPA more than 8 were shortlisted for internships. After going through rigorous telephonic interviews, nine students were selected for internship. TRDDC is offering paid internship to these nine students. Each of these students will get opportunity to work with different research scientists in areas like Machine Learning and algorithm development.

#### 3. Bhabha Atomic Research Centre (BARC Mumbai)

Dr. Pooja Jain (Faculty in charge and HoD-CSE) coordinated with Dr. Lalit Singh (Sr. Scientist@ BARC) to explore internship opportunities at BARC. Dr. Lalit Singh interviewed and selected three students for semester long internship. The interns would be working at GUI Development project under the guidance of Dr. Lalit Singh. The internship shall be for 8 months starting from 20th May 2019.



#### 4. AllinCall Research and Solutions, Mumbai

AllinCall is a Mumbai based start up providing Enterprise scale ChatBots and VoiceBots and other related Al/ML based solutions. The company is looking for students who are willing to work as interns. Subsequently, an online test for internship was conducted on 22nd Feb 2019 at 9.30am in Lab 201. Two students were selected for internship.

#### 5. Persistent Systems Private Limited, Nagpur

Persistent Systems conducted online test as a part of internship drive on 3rd April'19. 17 students out of 24 passed the online test (Passing Percentage: 70%) Subsequently, Ms. Kamna Arora, Mr. Saurabh Jain and Mr Prafulla Doye from Persistent Systems visited IIITN campus on 15th April'19 to conduct interviews. Two rounds of Technical interviews and one HR interview was conducted. 6 students out of 15 were finally selected for semester internships.

#### Internships

Internship is a crucial part of the curriculum. Students at IIITN have to undergo mandatory semester long internship at industry of repute. This ensures that the students are able to relate the classroom learning to the real life situations in the industry. The students are given credits based on their performance in the internship.

This year, the semester long internship is to be done in the 7th semester (July'19 to Dec'19). The T&P Office strives to build the network of companies, start-ups, Govt Institutes etc. In a span of few months, it has been successful in associating with major companies in and around Nagpur.

There are paid as well as unpaid Internships. The stipend amount paid to the interns ranges from Rs.5000/- to Rs.20000/-




### 14. EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES AND EVENT AS PER MHRD GUIDELINE

# SCHEDULE: 23 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. BASIS FOR PREPARATION OF ACCOUNTS: The accounts are prepared under the Historical Cost Convention unless otherwise stated and generally on the Accrual method of accounting.

### 2. REVENUE RECOGNITION

- 2.1 Fees from Students (except Tuition Fees), Sale of Admission Forms and Interest on Savings Bank account are accounted on cash basis. Tuition Fees collected separately for each semester is accounted on accrual basis.
- 2.2 Income from Land, Buildings and Other Property and Interest on Investments are accounted on accrual basis.

### 3. FIXED ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION

- 3.1 Fixed assets are stated at cost of acquisition including inward freight, duties and taxes and incidental and direct expenses related to acquisition, installation and commissioning.
- 3.2 Gifted / Donated assets are valued at the nominal value. They are set-up by credit to Capital Fund and merged with the Fixed Assets of the Institution. Depreciation is charged at the rates applicable to the respective assets.
- 3.3 Books received as gifts, are valued at selling prices printed on the books. Where they are not printed, the value is based on assessment.
- 3.4 Fixed assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on fixed assets is provided on Straight line method, at the following rates:

3.6 Where an asset is fully depreciated, it will be carried at a residual value of Re.1 in the Balance Sheet and will not be further depreciated. Thereafter, depreciation is calculated on the additions of each year separately at the rate of depreciation applicable for that asset head.

3.7 Assets created out of Earmarked Funds and funds of Sponsored Projects, where the ownership of such assets vests in the Institution, are setup by credit to Capital Fund and merged with the Fixed Assets of the Institution. Depreciation is charged at the rates applicable to the Institution arc separately disclosed in the Notes on Accounts. respective assets. Assets created out of Sponsored Project funds, where the ownership is retained by the sponsors but held and used by the

the holders of such assets. depreciation is provided in respect of such assets at the time of their acquisition. ### 6. INVESTMENTS

### 8. GOVERNMENT AND UGC GRANTS

March and the grant is actually received in the next financial year, the grant is accounted on accrual basis and an equal amount is shown as recoverable from the Grantor.
- 8.2 To the extent utilized towards capital expenditure, (on accrual basis) government grants and grants from UGC are transferred to the Capital Fund.
- 8.3 Government and UGC grants for meeting Revenue Expenditure (on accrual basis) are treated, to the extent utilized, as income of the year in which they are realized.
- 8.4 Unutilized grants (including advances paid out of such grants) are carried forward and exhibited as a liability in the Balance She

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of the Indian Institute of Information Technology, Nagpur for the year ended 31 March 2019.

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the Indian Institute of Information Technology, Nagpur ('the Institute') as at 31 March 2019, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 28(3) of the Indian Institutes of Information Technology (Public-Private Partnership) Act, 2017. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules and Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/ CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we

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plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

- Based on our audit, we report that:
- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations which, to the best of our knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
- ii. The Balance Sheet, the Income & Expenditure Account and the Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this Report have been drawn up in the new format prescribed by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India vide Order No.29-4/2012-IFD dated 17 April 2015.
- iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Institute as required under Section 28 of the Indian Institutes of Information Technology (Public-Private Partnership) Act, 2017 in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.

### iv. We further report that:

### A. General Comments

- Contribution to Provident fund, Honorarium paid, security charges paid, Expenses on Postage and Stationery,
   Caution money collected, etc. are not shown distinctly in respective schedules.
  - As per format of accounts provisions for Retirement benefits viz. Pension, Gratuity, Leave encashment are to be made on actuarial basis in the Balance sheet. However, such Provision is not made in the Balance Sheet for the year ended 31 March 2019.
  - 3. New Pension Scheme Fund belongs to the members of those funds and not to the organization. The accounts of the New Pension Scheme have to be separated from the accounts of the organization. Separate Receipts and Payments Account, Income and Expenditure Account and Balance Sheet are to be prepared at the end of the financial year. The status of New Pension Scheme should be disclosed in the organization's Notes to Accounts.

### B. Grant-in-aid

Out of grants received of ₹37.52 crores (₹17.00 crore for Capital Asset, ₹ 6.15 crore for Revenue Expenditure and unspent balance of ₹14.37 crore carried forward from previous year), the Institute utilized ₹ 6.38 crore (₹6.36 crore for revenue expenditure and ₹0.02 crore for capital expenditure) during the year and after considering the internally generated income of ₹8.65 crore, the unutilized grant as on 31st March 2019 worked out to ₹39.79 crores which includes ₹10.64 crore of capital advance paid to NBCC.

Out of grants received from Government of Maharashtra of ₹21.10 crore (including unspent balance of ₹1.20 crore carried forward from previous year), Institute utilized ₹15.10 crore for capital expenditure leaving unspent balance of ₹6.00 crore.

### C. Management Letter

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Indian Institute of Information Technology, Nagpur, through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, the Income & Expenditure
